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President's Message

I have just returned from a successful but disappointing Executive Board Meeting in Ontario. Successful because a report by Convention/Conference Chair Ursula Gibson, left me feeling good about the 2008 convention. Workshop leaders and speakers are in place, many from our own organization. Ursula was successful in securing \$450.00 from a Poets and Writers grant to pay for some conference costs. We first sought such monies for the 2006 convention when secured funds allowed us to bring California Poet Laureate Al Young to Fresno. I believe grants such as that provided by Poets and Writers could become a staple of future conference planning.

The meeting was disappointing because of Marge Voigt's decision to withdraw from the position of Convention Chair for the 2009 convention. Sentiment at the Ontario meeting was strong to return to a North-South convention schedule and it was decided to hold the 2009 convention in Modesto. Marge believes a Convention Chair closer to the actual site of the convention would better facilitate conference planning. Consequently, I would like to hear from any of you regarding your willingness to act as Convention Chair for the 2009 convention in **Modesto.** Please contact me as soon as possible. Member at large, debee loyd, , was appointed Program Chair for 2009 at the October board meeting. The convention chair and program chair will need to coordinate some aspects of the convention. Following that discussion, a decision was made to return to Ontario for the 2010 convention and subsequent to the Ontario meeting I have appointed Marge Voigt once more as Convention Chair; this time for the 2010 convention which will be in Ontario. I will be asking the Executive Board to ratify that appointment in the near future.

While I regret Marge Voigt's decision to withdraw from the Convention Chair position in 2009 and applaud her decision to accept the same position in 2010, it does permit me to make an important point first made at the 2005 convention in Oakland. The convention is no longer a chapter (host) responsibility. The various roles needed to bring off a successful convention are no longer tied to geography. They are tied to the interest and skill of those people who choose to accept the responsibility. If this seems a surprise to some of you who well remember host chapters (I don't), look no farther than the very successful 2006 and 2007 conventions in Fresno lead ably by Dan Saucedo and Dave Lapierre, who were far apart in geography but united in goal. As for getting from one place to another physically, consider this.

It's a tough drive from Northern California to Southern California or the reverse. It's more than just a few dollars for gas. In discussion with my wife Roberta and PSJ President Bill Sehl, we think we could consider a charter bus solution. I have contacted a charter bus company in Stockton and have learned the bus will take us door to door from Stockton to Ontario for about \$80.00 each. The bus holds between 47-50 people and is a luxury model with comfortable reclining seats and on-board bathrooms. It's a 99 HiWay route, meaning some from Red Bluff or Sacramento could catch the bus in Stockton. It could stop in Modesto and later in Fresno, picking up passengers along the way.

I don't know if this is a good idea or not. What I do know is that a lot of folks have told me transportation is a problem. I think some new ways are worth consideration. It's time to stop talking about what we can't do and start talking about what we can do. President Sehl has promised to begin that dialogue with PSJ. I urge you to consider different ideas such as this at your next chapter meeting.

Cold Waters
